Updated Youth Protection Training

Most adult leaders and parents have probably received the emails from BSA or SFC about the updated YPT. Below is the copy I received from BSA.

Over the decades, the Boy Scouts of America has been a leader in developing training and policies designed to keep young people safe. Over time, these policies have become standard with organizations across the nation. Now, the Boy Scouts of America is releasing fully updated training to further strengthen our ability to protect youth.

These changes include:

- Updated Youth Protection Training, including insights from experts and survivors and the latest strategies for recognizing and preventing major forms of abuse. This is the designated Youth Protection Training for all adults. All volunteers must take the new training by October 1, 2018, no matter when they took the previous training.
- An expanded ScoutsFirst Helpline to aid volunteers and families in addressing potentially dangerous situations.
- Unlimited counseling and support for healing to anyone who has ever been abused in Scouting.
- Youth Protection Training for youth members available in 2019.

In addition to updated training, we recently announced new policies to ensure compliance with mandatory training requirements, including:

This information needs to be sent to the district executive by the end of May so the different types of recruitment fliers can be approved.


Cub Day Camps

SERVING CUB SCOUT, BOY SCOUT AND VENTURING GROUPS IN SOUTHEAST MIAMI-DADE COUNTY

- As of January 1, 2018, no new leader can be registered without first completing youth protection training.
- As of January 1, 2018, no council, regional, or national leader will be allowed to renew their registration if they are not current on their Youth Protection Training.
- As of September 1, 2017, no unit may re-charter without all leaders being current on their Youth Protection Training. Registrars no longer have the ability to approve charters without full compliance.
- Effective June 1, 2018, adults accompanying a Scouting unit who are present at the activity for 72 total hours or more must be registered as a leader, including completion of a criminal background check and Youth Protection Training. The 72 hours need not be consecutive.

With these changes, and many more outlined in the documents listed below, as well as the overview video, we will continue to build a safe environment for our youth. As an advocate and champion for youth protection in Scouting movement, I encourage you to watch the video, become familiar with the resource documents, take the training and spread the word.

We realize the Oct 1 training deadline will be a challenge for some – but the safety of our children is too important to delay.

Thank you for your work in sharing the message of safety in Scouting. You make difference every day, in ways you may never know. Truly, Youth Protection Begins with You.

Effective now, when completing the 4 modules of the Youth Protection Training course on the BSA Learn Center, the system will automatically email a PDF attachment of the Youth Protection Certificate to the email associated to your myscouting account! This YPT certificate will include the completion date and the expiration date. No more guessing when your YPT will expire, and no more waiting to access and print your certificate.

recommended that packs have at least one registered adult leader attend camp for every five to six Cub Scouts. Adults must complete Youth Protection Training and Hazardous Weather (both free online).

TIGERS – Scouts going into FIRST Grade must attend all week with a parent or adult guardian. They may not attend alone. Lions may NOT attend-they can look forward to next year.

Register your son for the grade that he is entering in the fall (August 2018) at school. Do not register him for the grade he is in now. Order of the Arrow Membership Update



During the National BSA meeting, the Order of the Arrow issued a membership change to take effect on February 1, 2019 to reflect that girl troops can form and will have the same advancement ranks that Boy Scouts have had.

Beginning February 1, 2019, unit elections will be permitted in Scouts BSA, Venturing and Sea Scout units. The new Order of the Arrow membership requirements are as follows:

- Be a registered member of the Boy Scouts of America.
- Have experienced 15 nights of camping while registered with a troop, crew, or ship within the two years immediately prior to the election. The 15 nights must include one, but no more than one, long-term camp consisting of at least five consecutive nights of overnight camping, approved and under the auspices and standards of the Boy Scouts of America. Only five nights of the long-term camp may be credited toward the 15-night camping requirement; the balance of the camping (10 nights) must be overnight, weekend, or other short-term camps of, at most, three nights each. Ship nights may be counted as camping for Sea Scouts.
- At the time of their election, youth must be under the age of 21, hold the Scouts BSA First Class rank, the Venturing Discovery Award, or the Sea Scout Ordinary rank or higher, and following approval by the Scoutmaster, Crew Advisor or Sea Scout Skipper, be

FAQs

Q. Will camping be counted retroactively for those currently in Venturing and Sea Scouts?

Yes. Camping that has taken place within the two years immediately prior to the election will be counted beginning February 1, 2019. This camping must have taken place while an individual was registered with the BSA as a program participant and must be while participating with a BSA Venturing Crew or Sea Scout Ship.

Q. Can I be elected into the OA if I am over the age of 18?

Yes. As long as you are under the age of 21 at the time the election is held. If you are over 21, you will need to go through the adult selection process.

Q. Will there be any opportunities for Venturers to learn more about the OA and Venturing?

Yes. We will provide high-level information and the opportunity to gather feedback from youth Venturing participants at VenturingFest 2018, which will be held July 1-6, 2018.

Q. When will the OA literature be updated to reflect these changes?

Flag Day

The Continental Congress on June 14, 1777 issued this resolution: That the flag of the United States shall be of thirteen stripes of alternate red and white, with a union of thirteen stars of white in a blue field, representing the new constellation.

A flag of this design was first carried into battle on September 11 1777, in the Battle of the Brandywine. The American flag was first saluted by foreign naval vessels on February 14, 1778, when the Ranger, bearing the Stars and Stripes and under the command of Captain Paul Jones, arrived in a French port. The flag first flew over a foreign territory in early 1778 at Nassau, Bahama Islands, where Americans captured a British fort.

Observance of the adoption of the flag did not begin until almost a century later. Although there are many claims to the first official observance of Flag Day, all but one took place more than an entire century after the flag's adoption in 1777.

On June 14, 1889, Professor George Boach, principal of a free kindergarten for the poor of New York City, had his school hold patriotic ceremonies to observe the anniversary of the Flag Day resolution. This initiative attracted attention from the State Department of Education, which arranged to have the day observed in all public schools thereafter.

Franklin K. Lane, Secretary of the Interior, delivered a 1914 Flag Day address in which he repeated words he said the flag had spoken to him that morning: "I am what you make me; nothing more. I swing before your eyes as a bright gleam of color, a symbol of yourself.

Inspired by these three decades of state and local celebrations, Flag Day, the anniversary of the Flag Resolution of 1777, was officially established by the Proclamation of President Woodrow Wilson on May 30th, 1916. While Flag Day was celebrated in various communities for years after Wilson's proclamation, it was not until August 3rd, 1949, that President Harry Truman signed an Act of Congress designating June 14th of each year as National Flag Day.

A flag retirement ceremony will be held at American Legion Post 67 on Sunday, June 24 at 2 p.m. The address is 14901 W Dixie Highway, North Miami. Mr Jorge Montes will be leading the event. Food will be served after the ceremony.

This year there have been up to a dozen Scouters who have gone down to Camp Sawyer to repair damage done by Hurricane Irma. The National Sea Base Britton Center has provided lodging and meals. The first session also had several rangers from the Summit come down. The 2nd session was held the same weekend as the Conch Craziness.

Completed projects:

- Enclosed the area under the Ranger residence for equipment storage and mini shop (including 10' of Shelving). This included lighting and power outlets provided by our own electrician Facundo.
- Future shelving may be useful if Ranger Mike thinks we need it.
- Installing a roof over the old dumpster area turning it into storage for Kayaks and Paddle Boards.
- Installed shelving for the Kayaks (ran out of time to complete the installation of racks for the Paddle Boards.
 This will come as soon as we can schedule another trip)
- Cleaned out (by the boys), constructed and installed 24' of shelving in the downstairs storage room.
- And placed all items back in the room as per Ranger Mike's instruction (by the boys)
- Placed additional bracing under the dock for stability (short term) We have a plan to radically improve the stability at a future date.
- Applied Thompson's Waterseal to all picnic tables, and fencing. This was done by the boys as part of their service





responsibilities for the weekend.

• Installed two posts for the purpose of stopping traffic from entering campsites. Also done by the boys.
